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Theme 1: {Proving Cultural Identity through Contemporary Art Discourse}

His works often depict heroic figures inspired by the ancient Mesopotamian heritage, embodying historical eras such as the Babylonian, Assyrian, Akkadian, and Sumerian civilizations. Through these narratives, he revisits social customs and human values, presenting a modern interpretation of these ancient legacies. Al-Obaidi's paintings tell stories of cultural and intellectual evolution, reflecting the timeless struggle for cultural identity, and human aspirations toward justice, peace, and societal values.

Al-Obaidi's works, often framed within a symbolic or philosophical discourse, delve into the phenomenological experience of reality. Influenced by the theory of phenomenology, he examines how subjective experiences shape individuals' understanding of the world. This exploration highlights the ways human consciousness perceives and reacts to external phenomena, emphasizing the importance of individual experience in understanding the essence of things. His paintings, with their powerful depictions of symbolic events, encapsulate the awareness of humanity's historical journey, reflecting the fusion of myth and modernity.

Al-Obaidi's methodological approach in creating his paintings incorporates elements from cubism, abstraction, Islamic motifs, and cultural heritage, allowing him to document the historical, biological, and psychological phenomena of Arab cultures. His visual works capture the dichotomy of life and death, light and darkness, in works that engage with universal human experiences, while also inviting viewers to explore the depths of their own inner worlds.

His artistic contributions, especially in works such as "New Person" and "Iraqi Revolutionaries," delve into political and philosophical themes, exploring human existence and societal struggles. Through symbolic representations of immigration, identity, and exile, Al-Obaidi weaves narratives that reflect the anguish and struggles of displaced peoples, especially during the turbulent history of Iraq. His exploration of "unconscious behavior" in his series "Chairs" is an analytical reflection of human psychology, influenced by the subconscious forces shaping individual and collective identities. The artist's works offer a poignant commentary on the human condition and provide a meaningful connection between cultural identities and universal experiences.
